
## **English Secondary PGCE**

Useful information to build your subject knowledge before starting the course



Welcome to the English PGCE at Roehampton!

## A. Subject knowledge

Use your own subject audit (completed prior to interview) to assess your strengths and areas for development. To get ready for the course, you might want to complete some of the following tasks:

1. **Write** freely for 20-40 minutes about your experience of English as a child. Did you enjoy English lessons? Did you read for pleasure? Were there aspects of the subject that bored or frightened you? When were you inspired? Why do you think it is important to consider your own schooling?

The National Writing Project has lots of inspiration for English teachers, including <u>daily prompts</u> to get you writing:

2. **Watch** a range of video clips of English lessons and make a note of your responses. Do you think that the lessons you watched are 'good'? What criteria are you using to judge these lessons?

- 4. **Familiarise** yourself with the latest English GCSE and A level exam board 'specifications' and past exam papers:

- 5. **Read** some <u>research</u> which has been recommended by the National Association for Teachers of English (NATE).
