Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete this module will:

- Foster a curiosity about London as a setting for texts using magic, murder, and mystery as core themes.
- Have a secure knowledge of a range of London-based texts from the Victorian period to the present day.
- Develop historical, literary, and geographical knowledge of key locations for London texts in the module, and beyond.
- Express themselves using differing pedagogical forms, including a class presentation, creative self-guided walking project, and a research-based academic essay.

Assessments

Assessment for this module will consist of two assignments:

- 1. **Individual class presentation** on one aspect of the module and/or the text(s), to be arranged in class. Can also cover material from other excursions and your own relevant material about London's relationship with magic, murder, and/or mystery. (6-8 minutes 25% of grade)
- 2. Psychogeography project, which involves an hour-long exploratory walk in the City of London and Barbican Estate. In groups of up to 3, students will record their journey using psychogeographical methods and their choice of media, over the course of the hour, and report back to the instructor and their class. (2 page // 500 word report, and additional creative media attached 25% of grade)
- 3. **Research essay** on any aspect of the module which covers at least one of the class texts in detail, and incorporates secondary critical sources. The topic of the essay will need to be decided and shared with the instructor in class (see schedule). (4-6 pages // between 1000-1500 words, *not* including references 50% of grade)

(Note: this essay format is subject to change to an in-class, written exam on the final day of class, should the instructor find it necessary.)

Excursions

There will be two "excursions" into London proper as part of the course. During these trips, we will visit, explore, and interact with parts of the city relevant to the course texts and their surrounding issues. The specific times, dates, and activities of these excursions will be decided closer to the running dates of the course, but please bring an Oyster card, as well as additional spending money for food/drink/souvenirs (or pack your own). These will occupy the same time as class, and will last between 2 and 3 hours.

Important note: the last two summers have been incredibly hot, so please prepare yourself by bringing hot weather clothing, walking shoes, hats, sunscreen, and water for the excursions.
